2.2.1 - The institution assesses students' learning levels and organises special programmes for both slow and advanced learners.

NBKRIST follows a specific methodology to assess students' learning levels through MID-I and MID-II exams. After completion of the MID-I exam, each faculty member identifies the slow learners from their sections and conducts remedial classes in hybrid mode to motivate them to secure more than 60% marks and eventually prepare their mind set to clear the MID-II and end-of-semester exams with fruitful results. Students with 80 % or more marks are encouraged to learn advanced topics through online certification courses and learn foreign languages. They are motivated to research advanced topics through technical seminars, events, and hackathons. Students participate in national and international competitions, internships, paper presentations, and real-time problem-solving.

The campus manages solid waste systematically through collection, segregation, transportation, and disposal. A twin bin system separates biodegradable and recyclable waste, with clear labelling. Biodegradable waste, like kitchen waste and plant products, undergoes composting for use as manure in gardening. Non-biodegradable items such as plastic bottles, glass, and aluminium cans are separated and transported to local dump yards.
